COURSE DESCRIPTION

Since the early 1990s, Canadian cartoonists have been at the forefront of the alternative comics movement (as opposed to superhero or mainstream comics) that continues to gain critical, academic, and popular attention. This course introduces students to an array of Canadian comic books that tell a diversity of stories, across the spectrum from fiction to non-fiction. Since many of these works fall under the category of life writing, we will pay attention to how and why the hybrid visual-verbal medium of comics invites cartoonists to redraw such genres as auto/biography. confession, and travel writing. As well, the readings invite discussion of such topics as historical fiction, peace and conflict, memory and nostalgia, bodies and sexualities, race and ethnicity, place and identity, self and other. In addition to the comic books, students should be prepared to read critical and theoretical material.
